PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

It's been two years since our last community report, and here at the Suffolk Foundation, we have much to celebrate and share.

This publication spans 2022 and 2023—including terms of two different board presidents: Harry Cross and Mary Haddad—and while our Foundation has evolved over these past two years, what's remained ever-constant is our stewardship of the funds faithfully entrusted to us for Suffolk and Western Tidewater.

It's astounding to see how much we've grown since our very first grants in 2008 after the April tornado. In 2022 and 2023, we gave out over \$1.4 million in grants and scholarships to 110 nonprofits and 29 local students. We were grateful to receive two wonderful planned gifts in 2022 and 2023, and establish six new charitable funds, including a new scholarship (see page 8).

Our Women's Impact Fund grew to 40 members, we hosted forums on AI in Education and Amedeo Obici, and we published the Suffolk Community Resource Guide, in partnership with Virginia Legal Aid, Obici Healthcare Foundation, the Suffolk Public Library, and many local fraternities and sororities.

The Community Resource Guide helps Suffolk residents find local sources of support for things like food, shelter, and employment, and it could not have come sooner. For many of our neighbors, 2022 and 2023 were difficult times of rising costs and housing challenges. It's times like these when the benefits of a community foundation are most keenly felt. During tough times, when other donors must reduce their giving, our endowment remains steady and strong, providing grants, scholarships, and other sources of support year after year.

In 2024, we've got even more planned—more grants, more scholarships, more ways of supporting our community, under the strong leadership of a wonderful board and staff. We are excited for what's to come, and we are honored to have your support and partnership.

These competitive grants are supported by our Community Impact Fund, as well as eight other undesignated and field-of-interest funds.

What is a Donor-Advised Fund?

A donor-advised fund is a giving fund established by a family, business, or individual, who has ongoing involvement in how his/her fund is used. You recommend grants to nonprofit charities, and our staff handles all the paperwork, investment, accounting, and due diligence. We can offer you many flexible options, including timing/amount of grants, various investment and spending choices, and the ability to involve future generations of your family. Donor-advised funds are an easy, tax-advantaged, and inexpensive way to take your philanthropy to the next level.

What is a Designated Fund?

With a designated fund, you create an endowment to support your favorite nonprofit organization. It can be a service group, church, food pantry, park, school, or any other type of charity. The Suffolk Foundation handles the investment, and your chosen charity receives steady and reliable income each year.

What is an Agency Fund?

An agency fund is established by a nonprofit for its own organization. This is a great tool for nonprofits that don't have the investment capacity or expertise to manage their own endowment. Your organization can also use your fund at the Suffolk Foundation to enhance your capability to accept large, complex, and/or planned gifts.

In 2022 and 2023, the Suffolk Foundation awarded **\$119,000** in college scholarship to **29** deserving local students. Our 2022–2023 scholars are now working toward their degrees at Norfolk State, James Madison, Tidewater Community College, UVA, Virginia Tech, Hampton, Princeton, Stanford, and beyond.

In 2024, we added two new scholarships: the Oliver K. Hobbs, Sr. STEM Scholarship, which focuses on students studying science, engineering, technology, or math, and the Obici Healthcare Foundation Scholarship, a renewable award that focuses on students who plan to pursue a career in healthcare and return home to Suffolk and/or Western Tidewater.

CHUCKTUCK VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT Still Serving Their Community

The Chucktuck Volunteer Fire Department (or CVFD) got its start in the 1950s by community members who understood that their neighborhood needed a nearby fire station. Money was raised, equipment was bought, volunteers were recruited, and a fire house was built. Over the decades that followed, dozens of selfless volunteers bravely served their neighbors as emergency responders, and countless community members supported them through fish fries, dances, and the Ladies Auxiliary's events.

As the community grew, eventually the all-volunteer squad was responding to 500 fire and medical calls a year often in the middle of the night. Several men had been volunteering over 50 years. In time it was inevitable that a paid squad was needed, and by 2018 Suffolk Fire and Rescue assumed duty in Chuckatuck.

Once emergency services were transitioned to the City, the question arose of how to support the local community with the volunteer group's remaining funds. And so, in 2021, CVFD partnered with the Suffolk Foundation to create a scholarship program. The CVFD Scholarship is earmarked for graduating high school seniors who live in the historic CVFD service area, as well as descendants of CVFD volunteers. The first scholarships were awarded in 2022 to Avery Bowen and Lauren Howell. Structured as an endowment, the CVFD Scholarship will continue to help local student for generations to come—a wonderful next chapter for the story of service in Chuckatuck.

The Women's Impact Fund of the Suffolk Foundation empowers the women and children of Suffolk and the surrounding area to lead healthy and fulfilled lives. As of 2023, the fund had 40 members and had awarded almost \$25,000 in grants to area nonprofits.
